Doing the Right Thing... Two Communities Make the Move Towards Recycling

The cities of New Boston and Keithsburg are considering the possibilities of contracting for solid waste services. The Invitations for Bid of these services would include curbside garbage and recycling pickup. A large item service, including "white goods," with monthly pickup instead of having a village-wide cleanup once or twice a year, would be included. All municipal facilities, campgrounds, public works buildings, City Hall and parks would be included in the contract. Any special events during the year, such as the "Firemen's Fish Fry," would have dumpsters provided to handle the garbage. And finally, all local schools would have free recycling. Welcome aboard, New Boston and Keithsburg!

Where Rubber Meets its Maker

The dangers from mosquito born diseases have increased with the presence of the West Nile virus. In the four years since the virus surfaced in North America, it quickly spread across the United States. More than 4,000 reported human cases and 264 deaths were attributed to the disease in 2002. The co-conspirator to this disease is the discarded tire - the perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes. A tire collection is not only addressing this environmental issue, but one directly related to health.

The goal this year is to collect 20,000 tires. To increase participation, a new incentive has been added - the rims can stay on the tires! Network with your neighbors, and spread the word about this important collection.

The FREE Used Residential Tire Collection on September 26 and 27 is sponsored by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA), the Mercer County Board and the Mercer County Farm Bureau. The collection will be held at the Mercer County Garage, one and a half miles west of Aledo on Route 17, from 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM.

Guidelines for the collection include:

1. Only tractor, truck and passenger tires are accepted.
2. Tires will be accepted with rims.
3. Tires ARE NOT accepted from commercial sources such as dealers, gas stations, or commercial trucking companies.
4. No large industrial or off-road tires.
5. For individuals with more than 1,000 tires, the IEPA will pay for the removal of the last 1,000 tires, provided the owner pays for the removal of the excess tires. All participants must complete a Consensual Removal Agreement.

Macomb Yard Waste Program Revisited

Consider Your Yard Waste Options

Why bag yard waste when you can mow and mulch leaves and grass and leave it on your lawn for fertilizer? You can also chip or compost bushes and shrubs!

Still Want To Bag?

There is no limit to the number of yard waste bags, cans or bundles that can be placed at your curb. Put it next to your garbage on regular pickup day. However, it will cost you \$1.30 per can, bag or bundle during the summer months. Pickup is free between the second Monday in March and the end of spring cleanup. Yard waste stickers can be purchased at City Hall and at local retailers.

How to Prepare Your Yard Waste

Yard waste must be bagged in paper yard waste bags no larger than 5 cubic feet, or placed in 40 gallon trash cans, or bundled and tied with twine - not exceeding four feet in length or three feet in diameter. Loose or unbundled yard waste will not be collected! The use of plastic yard waste bags is prohibited.

What About the Big Stuff?

Large tree limbs, trunks and other bulky yard waste materials that cannot be properly bagged or bundled will not be picked up. These items can be disposed free of charge at the city's Yard Waste Center located on East Tower Road next to the McDonough County Animal Shelter.

Burning Stinks

Burning leaves and grass clippings is PROHIBITED in Macomb! Burning twigs, limbs, and branches ironically is still permitted, and is limited to during daylight hours. All fires must be tended by an adult, with a hose and water nearby.

It has been projected that in the U. S. alone, between 1997 and 2004, over 315 million obsolete computers will be destined for landfills--so called "e-waste." This waste could contain approximately 600,000 tons of lead, 1,000 tons cadmium, 200 tons of mercury and 600 tons of carcinogenic chrome VI. It is estimated that residents generate 31 pounds of e-waste annually.

Last winter, Julie Main of Galesburg, organized the first Electronics Collection in the area. The response was phenomenal! So Main is goin' for two.

The second FREE Electronics Collection will be held Saturday, October 11, from 9:00 AM to Noon. Ms. Main, with the cooperation of the City of Galesburg, has arranged the collection site to be at the new Naeir Warehouse building parking lot in the 1000 block of West Fremont. Guidelines include:

1. Computers, monitors and TV sets.
2. Any used and broken household electronic devices.
3. No washers, dryers, air conditioners, refrigerators or any other large appliances will be accepted.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection

Bring your toxic products from home any way you can!

Knox County and the IEPA are sponsoring a FREE Household Hazardous Waste Collection on Saturday, November 8, from 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM at the Galesburg High School, 1135 Fremont. Check your closets, basements, and garages for unused containers of chemicals, stains, and paints. The guidelines for this collection are:

1. Products that will be accepted: oil based paint (NO LATEX PAINT), insecticides, old gasoline, pool chemicals, cleaning products, used motor oil, lawn chemicals, solvents, antifreeze, and hobby chemicals.
2. Items not accepted: explosives, fire extinguishers, business or agricultural waste.

Despite Deterrences, Apartment Dwellers Can Recycle

We all know recycling household waste helps the environment by saving resources and reducing the amount of waste for disposal in landfills. But trash generated by apartment residents is often collected from a common dumpster. In most instances, there are no onsite advantages or recycling options for these residents.

In spite of this, apartment dwellers need to join the effort to recycle. One way they can do this is by making a conscious effort to buy products made from recycled material. The other is by designating areas within the apartment where specific waste can be collected. Using space efficiently, and making recycling convenient are two ways to successfully integrate recycling into apartment living. For what it's worth - residents can encourage apartment managers to start offering recycling by letting them know how important it is to them.

A New Alternative to the Dusty Road



Dusty roads have been treated with chemicals for years. The purpose was to control and stabilize rock dust. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has found that calcium chloride (used in dust

control) contributes to groundwater and well contamination and vegetation damage. Calcium chloride also blows off the road in dry weather, washes into ditches in rainy weather, and can cause icy patches in winter.

Now, a new product, Lignin LS-50, made from natural cellulose binders, (SAP) provides a dust free surface on unpaved roads. This product is Illinois state approved for motor fuel tax funds and does not contain chemicals subject to the reporting requirements of section 313 of the Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act of 1986.

Preemption Road Commissioner Larry Pearson has been using this product for several years. Other Commissioners might want to consider this environmentally friendly option as well.

Pesticide Container Recycling Program

The Pesticide Container Recycling Program is designed for farmers, retired farmers, nurseries, and structural pest control businesses. The program accepts only clean, dry, high density polyethylene (HDPE) #2 plastic agrichemical containers. All caps, labels, booklets and foil seals must be removed. (Never put a cap back on a rinsed container.)

Although the Single Day Collection schedule is over, it is possible for containers to be taken to permanent collection sites.

The Pesticide Container Recycling Program is sponsored by the Illinois Department of Agriculture, in conjunction with the Agriculture Container Research Council, GROWMARK Inc., the Illinois Fertilizer and Chemical Association, Tri-Rinse, Inc., United Agri-Products, UAP Richter, the Farm Bureau, and the U of I Extension.
